

Literary Terms Booklet Mini-project: Directions

In order to prepare for our upcoming EOC (end-of-course) assessment in December, you will complete a literary terms booklet mini-project. Please see below for your requirements:

1. You will design a book that contains at least 40 literary terms; you can decide whether you want one, two, or three examples per page (no more).
2. **Include the following on each page or section:**
 - a. The literary term
 - b. The definition of the literary term (*check out Ms. A.'s Quizlet!*)
 - c. A picture or example that illustrates the term, and
 - d. A brief explanation (1-2 sentences) of how the picture or example exemplifies the term.
3. Terms (and therefore pages) may be grouped by relationship or alphabetically. How you organize your pages is up to you, but be sure to put everything together in one package.
4. For the purposes on this assignment, **the entire mini-project must be completed by hand (on paper)**. This means no copying/pasting or printing pictures.
5. **This mini-project is due by 11:59 pm on Sunday, November 15th.**
